It has been a real hot one out West, one of the driest and hottest in a long time – so thankfully bowling season is about to ramp up and get us out of the sunshine...... Well, maybe not everyone is ready to put away the clubs and head indoors to the lanes......

It was a busy summer though and here are some of the highlights:

Bowl Canada Cup held July 8 & 9

We are proud to once again have a team from the FTA at the Canada Cup National Finals. In the 2016 inaugural event, the team from FTA qualified for the step ladder finals in 3'rd spot and coming home with the silver medal. This year another team from the FTA – **Annika Engelen, Sara Bagby, Wendy Knowles** and **Robert Campbell** - made it to the National Championships. After 14 grueling games over two days, they qualified for the step ladder finals in the number one spot with a team total of 13,640 which was 497 pins ahead of the second place team.

This meant they would bowl for the National title and the gold medal, needing only 1 more victory in a head to head match, but had to wait for the winner of the second & third place teams. Southern Ontario defeated Saskatchewan 972 to 877 and would be our opponent in the gold medal match. Having placed first, we only needed to win one of the two games to take the title. Southern Ontario took the first game 1,003 to our 924, setting up the winner take all showdown. By a score of 923 to 900, our FTA bowlers took the National crown and brought home the gold. CONGRATULATIONS!!!!!!

Arriving home, here they are, home safe and sound presenting their banner to hang at Let's Bowl.







Hamilton Tenpin News

GONE, BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

[Editor's Note: Jim told us that he was submitting "something different" this issue. He says it's easy to tell that he is very interested in Hamilton history, especially when it comes to bowling!]

With the recent closing of Bowlerama Stoney Creek, it joins the long list of former bowling houses no longer around. The names are familiar to some bowlers, but where were they located and what is there now? Bowlerama Stoney Creek was located across highway eight from Fiesta Mall and will be replaced by condos. Two other Stoney Creek houses long gone are Bar Don on Mountain Ave. & King St., now a parking lot, and Eastdale, on Grays Road which was destroyed by fire. Grimsby Pro Bowl on Livingston Ave. in Grimsby was torn down and there is a mall on the spot now. Strixxx, also in Grimsby was located close to Lake Ontario.

Another fire victim was Bowl–O-Drome on Parkdale, just south of Melvin. Also in east Hamilton was Queenston Bowl near the east end traffic circle. After starting out as Blondie's Lunch, it was converted to 10 bowling lanes by owner Carl Balon. Bowling stopped in 1988 and several businesses have occupied the site including the present tenants Lou's Music & Mystic Mojo who says the original ten lanes are still there, but covered over. Several were located in the area of the present Centre Mall on Barton with the main one in the 1960's being Hamilton Centre Bowl with 48 lanes at Barton & Ottawa, now the scene of a Wal Mart. After it closed in 1969 the building was home to a movie theatre & bingo hall. Across the street was the Winter Gardens, now Antique Alley. Upstairs at Barton & Kenilworth was Grand, a.k.a. Sabby's. The Dofasco Bowling Club, a.k.a. Pro Bowl Lanes was at 1047 Barton St. E. and is now the Church of Pentecost. Next door the Bowlero is the House of Grace of all Nations. The Ottawa Lanes were located at 172 Ottawa St. N. and the building is currently for lease. Close by at 278 Ottawa St. N. in a building from 1923 were the Fleming Alleys, now the scene of a furniture store and a repair store. At 75 Newlands were the Park Lanes.

The Albertonian, with four lanes in the basement of an apartment building opened on Dec. 19, 1925 and closed in the early 1930's, was three blocks from Gage Park and close to St. Peters Hospital. The apartment building is still in use with the former lane space now used for storage. The "Entrance To Bowling Lanes" carved in cement is still there, but covered over with vines. At Kenilworth & Main was the Kenilworth Lanes, which was also known as Eagleton, Handley & Cinderella. Located next to the long gone Windsor theatre, the area is now a parking lot & an empty building. The Co-Op Lanes were in the Normanhurst Community Centre's basement at Barton & Walter Ave. N. On Glow Ave. just east of Woodward, there is a variety store which I was told had alleys many years ago.

In downtown Hamilton were several with the Olympia Lanes in the basement of the Lister Building on James St. N. In 1928 it was also known as the United Bowling Club. The Central Lanes had two locations, in 1928 at 46 King St. E., now a Salvation Army thrift store on the first floor with the top three floors, where the lanes were, now for rent. Then in 1948, they were across the street from Hamilton City Hall at 28 Park St. S. Hamilton Place & the Art Gallery now occupy the area. The Connaught Lanes , also had another name, Midtown, and the 26 lanes were located on three floors at 25 John St. S. from 1928 to 1972. On James St.









North were the Crown at 181, now an empty lot awaiting the Residence at Acclamation condos. The Tivoli, a.k.a. Coopers & Hamilton Bowling & Athletic Club, at 112 next to the Tivoli Theatre, is now a CBC building. MacDonalds at 66 James St. N., is now a McMaster Student Residence on the third floor. The name MacDonalds from 1890 is still visible at the top of the third floor. The lanes are still there but covered over.

In the basement of the Y.M.C.A. at James & Jackson from 1908 to 1967 were the Y.M.C.A. Lanes with Ed Taylor the proprietor. Other bowling houses that were discovered but with no locations were Arrow, Bulmers, Commercial Club & Robinson. Way back in the early 1900's were the Iron Duke Alleys, across the street from the long gone Hamilton Herald Newspaper office. According to a former oldest Hamilton bowler, Ed Buckingham, another Lucky Strike Alleys were also in the downtown core as were alleys where the present Hamilton Tiger Cat Head Office is located at Jarvis & King. Stelco had a building on Wentworth, just south of Burlington St. which according to a former employee had a lunch room and bowling alleys. In 1941 International Harvester erected a staff house for 529 men at Burlington & Sherman which included eight bowling alleys and eight billiard tables. They were torn down, along with the Winston Hall Lanes five years later .

Pla - Mor Lanes on two floors were at 749 Barton St. E., only a short distance from Tim Hortons Field. Apartments are on the second floor, with the lanes still there, but covered over. At 743 King St. East were Roberts Lanes, a.k.a. Strand. The Winston Hall Lanes were at Barton & Lottridge in the early 1940's. It was a "W.A.C.'s residence. The Beach Road Lanes, a.k.a. Beaches, were at 176 Beach Rd. , and again had a second name, Dusan Bowling Alleys. The Mohawk Alleys in 1959 were at 705 Mohawk St. E., and is now an apartment building. At one time it featured candlepin bowling. Sportsman Lanes at 467 Charlton Ave. E. closed many years ago. The Hamilton Convalescence Hospital on West Fifth. had a pair of alleys available for armed forces personal in the 1940's. The Hamilton Herald from March 11, 1910 stated "there was at the corner of John & King St. in 1852 a bowling alley. They may be in the basement today." For many years the location was a furniture store.

Going out of town to Burlington were the Brant Alleys on Brant St., across from Smith's Funeral Home. It burnt down with the location now a restaurant. Ancaster Country Lanes on Sandhill Rd., is now a banquet centre. The Dundas Alleys on Foundry St. is occupied by a private business with one lane, complete with 10 bowling pins, still visible. The Dundas Bowling Lanes were at King St. East & East Ave., next to the Desjardins Canal. In Brantford were the Mohawk Lanes on Colbourne St. Bowlerama Oakville is now a Home Depot. Burl Oak Lanes on Lakeshore Road, a.k.a. Skyway Plaza Lanes, closed a couple of years ago. As of a few years ago a private house on King St. in Stoney Creek had one lane in the basement. Until it was a fire victim in 1981, Canal Bowl, a.k.a. New Pier Bowl, was located on the Beach Strip next to an amusement park. Across the street for a short time were outdoor lanes next to Lake Ontario. There are pictures on a local web site of the lanes. There are unconfirmed rumours of other outdoor lanes at King St. E. and Parkdale S. , next to the long gone Wondergrove. The Pat Quinn Arena is only a couple hundred feet away.

Completed in 1891, the Royal Hamilton Yacht Club on the main floor had a bowling alley and pool rooms until it was another fire victim on Sept. 18, 1915. The Ocean House opened in May 1875 and had a bowling alley and three pool tables on the main floor and was also destroyed by fire on July 17, 1895. Both were located on the Beach Strip and were similar in appearance.

Dundurn Castle had four alleys installed by the Dow Brothers, starting on November 22, 1873. which could be the location of the first ever 300 in the world on February 1, 1881 by Frank Young. The alleys are still there but









were partially damaged by a fire in the 1930's when the location was a café. The location is now used for office space. The James St. Armouries had two alleys on the main floor just over 100 years ago with the space now a supply store. According to Sister Irene, The Notre Dame Academy on Snake Rd. in Waterdown had two five pin lanes from 1965 to 1995 for the academy staff, not open to the public. The location is now a park.

Three more have come to my attention. Westdale Lanes on Main St. West, later a bingo hall, Shea's Oak Queen in Oakville and Orchard Lanes in Grimsby. Some of these "bowling alleys" as they were known for many years, were only around for a few months, some a few years, and some much longer.

This list of over 50 names & locations, is not complete as there are records of bowling alleys permits being applied for on September 28, 1833, March 21, 1843 and in 1847 for King St. & King William. If these permits were granted is unknown. There could be other bowling alleys in the Hamilton area, but as now, these above is all that are known. Still looking for others.

There are currently 11 five and ten pin "houses" in the Hamilton & District Association. Here's hoping they will not be joining the above list any time soon.

The Thankless Job of a Bowling Center Proprietor

More and more often now – everywhere, not just in bowling, obviously – I am seeing more and more negativity. It seems like every night I am seeing bowlers complain about their center — the center they choose to bowl league at.

Whether it's the pattern used, the center's topography, or the "environment" in which they're playing, bowlers seem to find something to gripe about. And it is a shame.



I am very fortunate. I run a shop at one of the best centers I have ever been to. Our proprietor is top notch, and makes sure that her establishment is, as well. I have never been to a center that does more routine maintenance and inspections than here, at Batt Family Fun Center, located in Jacksonville, Florida.

It really is just done correctly here. And I truly appreciate that.

But still, even here, in what I consider one of the best run centers in the state – if not the country – I still see people

complain that it isn't up to their, the bowlers, standards.

And I am not really sure what more could be done. The staff here already goes above and beyond what is required, in my book.

All that being said, though, I am not the only one that bowls/works in a great facility with a great proprietor obviously; they're located all over the country. Sure, there are some centers that haven't aged well. I get it. And yes, you may, on occasion, run into a bad proprietor here and there. It happens sometimes. I get it. Trust me. But for every "bad center" or "bad proprietor" there are two or three good ones.

And those good centers and good proprietors deserve some respect and some credit for what they do to keep their center running the way that it does. It isn't easy. And, unfortunately, more often than not, they don't get it.

It is sort of like that old saying: "When I do right, no one remembers; when I do wrong, no one forgets."

I cannot tell you how many amazing things my local center has done over the past few years to improve their standing with both league bowlers and open play bowlers, alike. They've installed more lanes, they have improved their arcade, they've added mini-golf and laser tag, they've bought a flex machine. They change the pattern every year, giving the bowlers a new challenge and opportunity to grow and get better. And, still, to this day, they continue to try and improve the facility. Literally, almost every day, they get together and ask themselves "what more can we do?" Or, "how can we get better?"

But still, for the most part, I see no love. I see no appreciation. And worst of all, I still, from time-to-time, see complaints. Even though I can tell you with the utmost confidence that I have been to a lot of centers in my

career, and I haven't seen much better anywhere around the country. Not from a proprietary and staff standpoint.

But that isn't just here, I'm sure. I can almost guarantee you that this is how it is all over the country. Good centers and good proprietors are too often taken for granted. And that isn't fair, because honestly, that isn't always the case, as I said earlier.

So do me a favor, please. If you bowl at a great center or know a terrific proprietor, please share that information with others, in person, or maybe via social media. Spread the word that they run a top notch facility and let them know that they're doing a great job, because, trust me, they don't hear it enough. No related posts.

WORLD SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Our Canadian Team had a fantastic week at the World Senior Championships. Here's the story, as told by Brian McLean, one of our regular reporters, from Ontario. Brian says he garnered much of his information from USBC and Bowling Digital reports.



Jill Friis and France Joubert of Canada (left to right) captured the gold medal in women's doubles at the World Senior Championships 2017, while USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III and Bob Learn Jr., United States, took the men's title at Dream-Bowl Palace in Unterföhring near Munich, Germany on Friday.

In the women's final, **Joubert and Friis**, who won bronze at the World Senior Championships 2015, finished strong to overtake Leanne Hulsenberg and Tish Johnson, United States, 401-390. Friis hadn't struck through the first eight frames but was able to close the match with four strikes for a 195 game. Joubert, who tossed four consecutive strikes after starting the gold-medal match with a 1-2-4-10 washout, contributed a 206 game to the winning performance.

In the women's semi-finals, the Canadians, Friis (213) and Joubert (203), who earned the last spot for the medal round, stunned top seeded Carolyn Dorin-Ballard (175) and singles champion Lynda Barnes, (185), United States, 416-360.

Hulsenberg and Johnson flew past Mexico's Teresa Piccini, who won gold in doubles at the inaugural WSrC in 2013, Margarita Ramos, 470-343. USA and Mexico shared the bronze medal.

In the men's title match, Bohn and Learn recorded an exciting victory over their team mates Lennie Boresch and singles champion Ron Mohr, 439-427. Bohn and Learn, who led the men's qualifying with record six-game total of 2,519, made the finals with a victory over **Canada's Joe Ciach** and **Richard Lafleur** (left-right), 395-334, in the semifinal match.

Boresch and Learn cruised into the finals with a 402-321 win over Shaun Cummings and Andrew Frawley of Australia. Canada and the Australia took home bronze medals.

In singles play, on the men's side, Ron Mohr won his fourth gold medal in World Senior Championships when he defeated **Canadian Joe Ciach** in the title match, 202-180. Mohr struck on three of his first four attempts, while Ciach

opened in the fourth frame after leaving the 2-8-10 split. Ciach was unable to double in the whole game, but he narrowed the gap to 11 pins when Mohr failed to convert the 3-10 split in the ninth. Mohr rebounded with two strikes in the 10th to wrap up the title.

Mohr has won two gold medals in doubles and all-events at the inaugural World Senior Championships 2013 and added the team gold in 2015.

His semi-final match against his fellow team champion Lennie Boresch, went into overtime as both tied at 217. In the first one-ball roll-off, both players got a nine-count. Mohr struck on his second shot, while Boresch got another 9 to send Mohr to the finals.

In the other semi-final match, Ciach eliminated top-seeded Parker Bohn III, 221-191, to deny the PBA and USBC Hall of Famer an all-American title match. Ciach struck on four of his first five attempts and had another double in the eighth and ninth frame in an otherwise flawless game, while Bohn got five 7 pins and failed to convert a washout in frame six. Ciach received the silver medal, while Boresch and Bohn both got bronze.

In the Masters, Bohn, who started the Championships by winning bronze in singles and added gold in doubles and in the team event, averaged almost 230 for the day but started the title match against Ciach with a 170-256 loss. The 35-time PBA champion and four-time PBA50 titlist rebounded with a 197-188 and wrapped up the title with a 238-237 in the deciding third game. Ciach ended up winning the silver. Ciach, who won four medals in five events this week, including silver in singles and Masters, and bronze in doubles and team, defeated Stefan Yngström of the Sweden, 2-0 (213-180, 215-192), in the master semifinals.

In the women's team finale against doubles gold medalists France Joubert and Jill Friis and their team mates Laurie Griffith and Sharon Tataryn, the Americans, struck on six of their first attempts to put the game away well before the final frame, 235-191. In the second game, the Americans took advantage of two

splits by Joubert in the first and fifth frame, and sealed the victory with three consecutive strikes in frames 7-9, by Dorin-Ballard, Johnson and Barnes, 199-169. Canada took the silver medal and Sweden and Japan tied for bronze.



In their semi-final match against (left to right) **Richard Lafleur, Fred Phillips, Joe Ciach**, and **Conn Casey** of Canada, the Americans came back from a 1-0 deficit, with back-to-back wins, 214-196, 239-194, to advance to the gold medal match and Canada got the bronze.

A record field of 163 men and 110 women from a record 44 countries - players must be 50 years of age or above in the year of the championship - competed for gold, silver and bronze medals in singles, doubles, four-player teams, all-events and masters in the seven-day competition.

The U.S. team topped the medal tally with 18 medals, including nine gold, four silver and five bronze medals. Canada was the only other country to win a gold medal, thanks to Jill Friis and France Joubert, who won in doubles. The Canadians also took home three silver and two bronze medals.

All of our Canadian members brought home World Senior Medals. Fred Phillips, Conn Casey, Richard Lafleur and Joe Ciach won bronze in the Team; Richard and Joe a Bronze in Doubles and Joe a pair of silvers, one in the Singles and one in the Masters.

France Joubert, Jill Friis, Laurie Griffith and Sharon Tataryn won the bronze in the Team and Jill and France the Big Gold in Doubles.












The World Games

It's The Rule Submitted by Charlotte Konkle

Just some reminders to start the new season:

A <u>designated participant</u> is someone who helps out with any CTF sanctioned association - such as athletes, team members, coaches, officials, event organizers, administrators, club executives, members of committees and board of directors - we all have to be sanctioned through CTF - ARTICLE IV, Section A.

CTF National, provincial and local association <u>fees</u> for the current season, must be paid before the bowler completes his/her second scheduled league session.

All registration applications/sanctions must be submitted by the league secretary to the LocalAssociation Manager <u>within 30 days of receipt of such applications</u>.

The Association Manager will forward payment of the registration fees and a copy of the league sanction application to CTF and the provincial association <u>within 30 davs</u> of the receipt of the fees and registration applications from the league secretaries.

Chapter I Introduction IMPORTANT: SPORT/CHALLENGE LEAGUES

A new league designation has been created to bridge the gap in averages between the Standard (house) Condition and the Sport Condition. The new designation, "Challenge Condition" is to be used for leagues competing on lane conditions that fall between Standard and Sport Conditions. Starting with the 2017-2018 season, when a league submits its league sanction application, the league secretary must choose one, and only one, of the three lane condition options - Standard, Challenge or Sport.









A few things to consider when determining which lane condition option to choose:

- Sport patterns typically have an oil ratio of 4:1 or lower;
- Challenge lane conditions typically have an oil ratio of 4:1 to 8:1;
- Standard or "house' patterns used in many leagues have an oil ratio of 8:1 or higher, and average around 40 feet in length;
- The lower the oil ratio, the more difficult the pattern;
- Patterns have different shapes;
- Averages for leagues that bowl on Sport or Challenge Conditions are to be re-classified based on the conversion charts found in this playing rulebook.

See Chapter V for more details.

RULE CHANGES

Rule 100e - Handicap Leagues. A new rule #6 has been added, 'A handicap game or series shall not be capped unless provided by league rule. If a league adopts such a rule, a game or series cannot be capped below the highest possible scratch score.

Rule 3{9d - Reporting Prior Prize Winnings. This rule has been amended as follows:

(a) The prize amount shown in the first paragraph has been changed to \$300;

(b) Additional prize amounts added under Rule #2: \$300 in any one event; Total combined prize winnings of \$500 or more in any one tournament; Total combined prize winnings of \$1,000 or more in all tournaments within the past 12 months.

Rule 327c - Scoring Process. This is a new rule. A handicap game or series shall not be capped unless otherwise stated in the tournament rules. A game or series cannot be capped below the highest possible scratch score.

Designated Participants

16a. Responsibility

An individual bowling in CTF leagues and tournaments is responsible for but not limited to:

- 1. Ensuring they have the correct membership to participate
- 2. Abiding by CTF rules
- 3. Abiding by league or tournament rules
- 4. Ensuring their average is correct, prior to participation
- 5. Reporting prize winnings as stated in tournament rules and/or rule 319d.
- 6. Reporting any tournament average adjustment/rerate in accordance with rule 319c
- 7. Using a national average rerate

RULE 17a. Unfair Tactics

To change:

Penalty : loss of games, any and all monetary or non-monetary awards/winnings, league removal (see rule 115a or rule 115c), tournament disqualification (see rule 319a-319e) and subject to suspension from or denial of CTF membership

NOTE: a complaint may be filed only in the current season or the season immediately following the alleged violation. The complaint shall be in writing and detail the charge(s) against the designated participant(s) and the CTF rule involved. The complaint shall be signed by the person(s) making the charge(s) and filed with the CTF









National Office

Rule 329 - Protest and appeal, YOUTH CHANGE allows for protest on eligibility and/or average violations to be filed no later than 10 days after prizes are paid.

Coaching Development Submitted by Blaine Boyle

The Coach Development Committee and the Canadian Tenpin Federation have started taking the first steps in the Responsible Coaching Movement. The Responsible Coaching Movement is policies set out to ensure the safety and protection of our athletes and coaches.

There are three priorities to responsible coaching:

- 1. The Rule of Two
- 2. Background Screening
- 3. Respect and Ethics Training

These 3 priorities along with coaching certification will be our main priority going forward for the Coach Development Committee.

We already incorporate Ethics Training into our NCCP Program and will soon be launching Respect in Sport which will be a requirement to coach at all levels of competition, with Background Screening to follow.

From the Desk of Equipment & Specifications Submitted by Jim Lester

If you don't know or understand what equipment and specifications means; it would be defined as "all the boring stuff associated with bowling". During the summer months while most are on vacation, the golf course or the baseball field there are a select group of trained individuals who physically check attributes on the lanes we bowl on. There are approximately 25 measurements on a bowling lane, yes that is for one lane. Some measurements would include the gutter depths, tilt of the bed where the pins are set, depressions on a wood lane, a cross-wise tilt on a panel section on a synthetic lane and many, many other measurements. Just to give the readers a bit of a time schedule, it would take or should take, around 2 to 2 ½ hours with two people to perform these measurements for a 12-lane centre.

This is not a glamorous job in any manner. From personal experience, this writer has been performing this part of bowling for better than 25 years. The heat in most closed centres during the summer is unbearable and the people doing lane certification know from experience, you get dirty during this process. The vast majority of people performing this necessary task for our sport are volunteers. These measurements allow all bowlers from New Brunswick to British Columbia to compete on the same playing surfaces throughout our Country.









Our organization, The Canadian Tenpin Federation, has a list of all certified Lane Certification and Lane Inspection persons, but the list is a bit dated. Therefore, to update the list a mass email was sent to all Associations in Canada. The email was sent out in both official languages.

At first the responses were slow so the mailing was sent out again, and then again for a third time. The result is almost all Canadian Associations have now responded within the past six months.

Now the question you are asking: Why is CTF doing this?

CTF wants to identify the current active members in this process. CTF wants to learn which regions are lacking in either education, or volunteers, so we can address these issues through proper training.

CTF wants to ensure this important process it being done properly.

There are changes to the certification process coming up for the 2018-2019 season and CTF needs to know where to send this information. There also might be further changes for the 2019-2020 season. CTF would like to see an on-line, once-a-year update from all inspectors. This process has already started. We (CTF) just require the information.
